Guidance Aims

Cardiff Council is committed to keeping your child safe through a fair and consistent approach, and preventing violence and weapons possession in Cardiff. As a Child Friendly City, Cardiff upholds The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and puts young people at the centre of processes and decisions.

This guidance will be used when a young person is found in possession of a weapon on an education establishment's site either deliberately or unintentionally. Cardiff Council recognised that there are many issues facing young people today and there are many reasons why a young person may carry a weapon. It is expected that there will be a multi-agency approach to support the school or educational setting to identify suitable early interventions and create positive change through the curriculum and the culture of the setting.





Weapons in Schools and Educational Settings Guidance

If staff have a reasonable suspicion that a young person is in possession of a weapon on the grounds of the school or educational setting, it may be necessary to complete a search. This is important to keep everyone safe. In 2013, Welsh Government introduced a power, set out in Section 45 of the Violent Crime Reduction Act 2006, which allows schools in Wales to be able to screen any pupil for a knife or other weapon, and to search pupils suspected of carrying a weapon.

A SUSPICION MAY INCLUDE:

- Intelligence from staff, a parent or pupil e.g. suspected sighting, overheard conversation etc. Intelligence from the community
- Behaviour of the young person e.g. language and/or actions
- CCTV footage
- Information from a professional (case worker/social worker)
- Police Public Protection Notice (PPN)
 Information via social media

WHAT WILL HAPPEN DURING A SEARCH?

- Two members of staff will be present.
- It will take place in a secure, discreet place.
- The purpose of the search will be fully explained to the young person.
- Parents/carers will be informed following a search and the reasons for the search will be explained.
- Staff will use a search wand to remove any physical contact with the young person.





When a weapon has been found, an Incident Review Meeting should be arranged. It is a multiagency response to understand the reasons behind the incident taking place and discuss an appropriate package of support for the young person and the educational setting. The meeting aims to create a plan to understand how the young person can remain in education.

OUR GOALS



Keeping all children safe.



Keeping all staff members safe.



Supporting all children to remain in education.



Supporting schools and educational settings to help prevent children possessing weapons.

KEY INFORMATION

Every education setting will follow the same consistent approach:

- ► The young person should not return to the school and education setting until the Incident Review Meeting has taken place.
- It should take place within 5 school days of the incident.
- There should be at least **one daily** welfare check via a phone call.
- A trauma-informed investigation should take place to understand why the young person brought the weapon into school.
- ▶ Parents and/or carers should be invited.
